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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2026

The Trustees are pleased to present their annual financial report alongside a separate annual project report for the year ending 31 March 2026, prepared to meet the requirements for a Trustees' report and accounts for OSCR purposes.

Chairperson Report

As Chair of the Board, I am happy to report this was a significant development year for CHARTS, due to multiyear support from Creative Scotland, acknowledging CHARTS as strategically important in a national context. The board also recognises that this position would not have been possible without the continued annual support of Argyll and Bute Council which contributes to essential staff and delivery costs.

We have strengthened our partnership with the Council year-on-year including since 2023 through the management of the Argyll Collection, a notable group of artworks (including well-known Scottish and Ugandan artists) which forms a key educational resource to schools and communities throughout Argyll. Our partnership with liveArgyll that began in 2022, has also extended and we have not only worked together to support the care and development of the Council's sole museum, located in Campbeltown but to support other Council owned art and heritage assets to improve capacity for public and school engagement. Our partnership providing services at Campbeltown Museum also includes collaboration with the Kilmartin Museum, supporting its responsibility to Argyll and Bute Council for the museum's archaeology collection.

The role of CHARTS, to provide support to the culture, arts and heritage sector (individuals, organisations and communities) supported by experienced specialist staff teams remains reliant on securing external investment. In the past five years alone, CHARTS has attracted inward investment of more than £1.5m into the cultural economy of Argyll and Bute. This year, project support includes from the Scottish Government, Bòrd na Gàidhlig, Foras na Gaeilge, Museums Galleries Scotland, the Baring Foundation, Highlands and Islands Enterprise and the Art Fund as well as others highlighted within our Annual Review. Academic relationships have also been strengthened with the University of St Andrews and our work the School of Innovation and Technology at the Glasgow School now includes new collaboration with the University of Ulster.

Our work with members includes one-to-one and organisational support and building innovative partnerships, we continue to create new opportunities and work in the region.

All this is made possible only through the determination and relentless hard work of our staff and freelancers, brilliantly led by Executive Director, Kathleen O'Neill. Under her direction, we are now confidently delivering against our five-year [Business Plan](#) which maps out our aspirations and ambitions for the next period.

The board has also strengthened the governance and infrastructure of the organisation across this period. Ruth Wishart stood down as trustee in October and trustees: Liz Hunter, David Watt, and Dr Michael Pierre Johnson are now acting in Chair capacity supporting three new board subcommittees, Human Resources, Finance & Risk and Communications respectively. Councillor Luna Martin has continued to support the board in ex officio capacity for Argyll and Bute Council and the Board continues to receive linked officer support from the Council, through Arlene Cullum, Senior Economic Development Officer, Transformational Projects and Regeneration.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The organisation's purposes are the advancement of arts, heritage and culture within Argyll and Bute through developing cultural and heritage practitioners and organisations by working cooperatively and in partnership with others; developing and utilising effective communication across geographic and sectoral boundaries; cooperatively growing our audiences and customers by marketing ourselves and others locally, nationally and internationally; developing and delivering partnership projects that will excite, educate and entertain our communities and our visitors; and accessing and sharing resources and training in order to bring culture and heritage to a wider audience.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Going concern

CHARTS continues to appreciate the support and funding from Argyll and Bute Council and the Scottish Government through the Creative Scotland Development Fund, with funding confirmed for 2026/27 of £95,000 and £114,300 respectively. This funding combined with funding from various trusts and foundations plus other organisations has assisted to improve financial sustainability and the charity continues to seek funding for its aims and programmes of activities. Robust financial procedures and processes are in place to support delivery of objectives outlined in [CHARTS Business Plan](#) and to ensure it achieves best value through achieving a high standard of efficiency, effectiveness and economy.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

CHARTS is a registered SCIO (SC049113). The charity is governed by its governing document, the Articles of Association.

Decision making

The CHARTS Board meets quarterly and more often if required. To further support the development of the charity three subcommittees, also meeting quarterly with senior staff are now in place and strategic project working groups, comprised of stakeholders, staff and trustees are also created as necessary. The Board is responsible for holding regular meetings, and generally controls the activities of the organisation; for example, the board is responsible for monitoring and controlling the financial position of the organisation.

Induction and training of new trustees

Trustees of the charity are appointed by majority vote after being proposed by another member of the Board. New board members go through an induction process where they are introduced to the staff, talk through the corporate systems and the role and responsibilities of the board are made clear.

Steering Group

CHARTS is a membership organisation with over 750 members (individuals and organisations). The board has undertaken review of its Steering Group and overall support to membership, including with surveys during 2025-26. The organisation's support across this period has included to assist individual members and organisations to secure funding for their own initiatives, building cultural capacity across Argyll and Bute.

Independent examiner's report to the trustees of CHARTS ('the Company')

1. CHARITY INFORMATION

The charity is registered as a SCIO (Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation) and as a registered charity with Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR).

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer Equipment	- 33% Straight line
Website	- 20% straight line

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.
